In today's world, it's easy to view generosity as a financial transaction. However, the Bible teaches that generosity flows from the heart and is part of our calling as kingdom builders. It isn't just about money—it's about a life of stewardship, obedience, and service to others. As Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 8:2, "In the midst of a very severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity."

GROW

Read 2 Corinthians 8:1-7

This passage shows us the remarkable generosity of the Macedonian church, who, despite their severe poverty, gave abundantly. Their generosity didn't come from an abundance of resources but from a deep, overflowing joy rooted in their relationship with Christ. Their joy wasn't dependent on their financial situation - it was a joy that transcended their circumstances. It came from understanding that their giving was part of something much bigger:

contributing to God's work in the world. Their hearts were so transformed by God's love and grace that they saw their giving as a privilege, not an obligation.

Paul encourages the Corinthians to excel in the grace of giving, just as they excel in other areas of their faith. Giving isn't about meeting a requirement—it's an invitation to participate in God's kingdom work. It begins with a heart that is fully devoted to Him and recognizes that everything we have belongs to God. Our giving, like the Macedonians, should flow out of the joy of being part of God's work in the world, not out of obligation or excess. It's about responding to His grace by offering our resources, time, and hearts to further His kingdom.

Read Malachi 3:10

In this verse, God invites His people to test His faithfulness by bringing their full tithes into the storehouse.
